Your new birth control benefits

What's now covered by your Anthem Blue Cross and Blue Shield health plan or policy.1

As a part of the new health care reform law, we now cover 100% of the cost of some birth controls.1

Women covered by your health plan or policy can use the new benefits. Also, there are many types of birth control. So, based on what type you use, it may be covered under your medical or pharmacy benefit.

What's covered by your medical benefit

Some types of birth control help prevent pregnancy with a procedure done in a doctor's office visit, hospital or outpatient surgery center. We now cover 100% of the cost of these procedures, as long as they're done by a network doctor:

- Sterilization surgery for women
- Intrauterine devices (IUDs)

Contraceptive implant

- Birth control shots
- Diaphragms or cervical caps from a doctor

What's covered by your pharmacy benefit

Other types of birth control need a doctor's prescription. We now cover 100% of the cost of some prescription birth controls from a pharmacy or our home delivery service.

What you pay depends on whether the drug is generic or brand name. Generic drugs have the same makeup as brand-name drugs, but often cost less. We'll cover 100% of the cost of generic drugs and work with you and your doctor to help you choose generic drugs when it makes sense.

Sometimes we cover 100% of brand-name drugs, but only if your plan or policy has brand-name drug benefits and only if there isn't a generic form. If you buy a brand-name drug, but could have chosen a generic form, you may need to get consent, known as prior authorization. Check your plan or policy to learn more. You'll also need to pay a deductible, copay or coinsurance, based on your plan.

We now cover 100% of the cost of birth control methods, such as:1

- Birth control pills
- Contraceptive patches
- Contraceptive rings
- Prescription diaphragms or cervical caps from a pharmacy
- Emergency birth control pills or "morning after" pills that require a prescription

What's not covered?

We do not cover the cost of:

- Condoms
- Contraceptive sponges
- Spermicides

- Emergency birth control pills or "morning after" pills without a prescription
- Any birth control you can get without a prescription or doctor's treatment
- Birth control for men

¹ Some plans that were in effect on or before March 23, 2010 may be "grandfathered" and not include this birth control coverage. Also, some religious groups may choose not to offer this coverage. Check your plan documents to determine if your plan is grandfathered or if this coverage is available in your plan.

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
